- How far can the Trump administration endure?

The G7 summit is coming up soon.

The US wants to show off its achievements there.

Europe will not surrender to America so easily.

Canada is also a global middle power and will not give in to US demands.

The easiest country to negotiate with is Japan, which is also dependent on the US for its security.

It is doubtful whether major US industries can survive without parts supplied by Japan, and Japan does not need to compromise easily.

Anti-US forces, especially China, will use this opportunity to regain power.

The UN and the G20, which have been used by the US until now, are now convenient venues for China to exploit.

The EU and the Chinese bloc will step up their offensive as opposing forces, while the Commonwealth led by the U.K. will probably play a buffer role for a while.

Will the EU and the Chinese bloc become the main opposing forces, with the Commonwealth, with the UK as its ally, playing a buffer role?
